Request for Departmental Minor in Medieval and Early Modern Studies Proposed by Peter Loewen, Director

Request: The Medieval and Early Modern Studies (MDEM) Program requests the creation of an undergraduate minor in MDEM, which will be in addition to the already established undergraduate major in MDEM. The minor will be administered and monitored by the MDEM Program.

Endorsement: This proposal was endorsed by majority vote of the MDEM Program Advisory Board at the fall semester board meeting on 09.24.2019. The vote was unanimous.

Brief Summary of the Objectives of the Minor: The Medieval and Early Modern Studies Program has long sustained an active interdisciplinary major that has benefited from strong commitments from several departments within the Schools of Humanities, Music, and Social Sciences, from which the program draws its faculty and courses. The MDEM Program sees this minor as a coherent course of study for students to master a core body of basic knowledge about the medieval and early modern periods and have the opportunity to get a broad overview of this period as a field outside their major focus of study at Rice. Because the MDEM program is interdisciplinary in nature, we offer a wide range of courses from departments within the School of Music (Music History), the School of Social Sciences (Anthropology), and the School of Humanities (Art History, Classics and European Studies, English, History, Philosophy, Religion, Spanish, Portuguese, and Latin American Studies, and Visual and Dramatic Arts). This minor is a new opportunity to reach more students, specifically those who do not have space in their schedule to take our major. We are making this change also to compensate for removing our reduced requirements for double majors, a provision that dates to a time when Rice offered no minors. Starting with AY 2019-2020, all MDEM majors will take a minimum of 10 courses, whether or not they are double majors; students who are unable to do that, we hope, will be able to take our minor. The minor in MDEM is ideal for students who want to enrich their major studies at the University with an interest in interdisciplinary studies in the medieval and early modern period, and to explore how this body of knowledge might apply to their own specific academic or professional goals.

Requirements for the Minor: Please note that these requirements are entirely in tandem with the requirements for the undergraduate MDEM Major. The requirement that students take courses in more than one field (i.e. department) is stable in both the minor and the major because the MDEM program is at its core interdisciplinary. The difference is in the number of courses and required fields of study (10 courses for the major, from at least 3 departments, and 6 courses for the minor, from at least 2 departments). Senior thesis is an option for students in either the major or the minor.

A minimum of 6 courses (18 credit hours) to satisfy minor requirements

These courses must come from at least two different departments (e.g. Art History and Religion)

A minimum of 3 courses (9 credit hours) taken at the 300-level or above

Requirements for the Minor in Medieval and Early Modern Studies

A minimum of 6 courses (18 credit hours) to satisfy minor requirements
These courses must come from at least two different departments (e.g. Art History and Religion)
A minimum of 3 courses (9 credit hours) taken at the 300-level or above
No courses from study abroad or other transfer credit accepted for the minor requirement

In certain instances, courses not on this official list may be substituted upon approval of the Director of Medieval and Early Modern Studies. (Course substitutions must be formally applied and entered into Degree Works by the Official Certifier.)
